## INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

Globalization, or the integration of the different peoples and cultures of the world through actions and communications, has proceeded at such a rapid pace that the world has become almost one 'global village'. Countries and other actors in the international system have become dependent upon one another regardless of geography and nationalities. Consequently, international issues have become a major part of nearly every area of study — and an important educational need of any student planning to play an active role in our society.

Thus, the International Studies program is designed to study global and regional problems from an interdisciplinary perspective. Related activities help to broaden students' international horizons and assist them in the development of expertise in their area of interest.

### Why International Studies at Illinois Wesleyan?

- Choose a Geographic Area Concentration (Africa, Asia, Latin America, Russia and Eastern Europe or Western Europe) or a Functional Area Concentration (Developmental Studies or Diplomatic Studies).
- Study global and regional problems from an interdisciplinary perspective: the program pulls together courses from anthropology, economics, English, the languages, history, philosophy, political science, sociology, religion and other disciplines.
- Supplement your education with numerous study abroad options. Nearly half of IWU students study abroad for a semester, full year or May Term, and students have the opportunity to study in hundreds of locations in over 75 countries.
- Explore several disciplines that address the cultural, economic, historical, political and social problems which transcend national boundaries. This exploration will serve the educational and career needs of students who are interested in studying issues from a transnational perspective, and who are planning careers international organizations, foundations and agencies of the public and private sectors.

*Ph.D. — University of Leningrad*  
Research involves Soviet children’s literature, particularly fairy tales. She teaches all levels of Russian language, as well as numerous courses in Russian literature and culture in translation.

Dr. Callahan is both a linguist and medievalist. He brings expertise in phonetics, translation and medieval lyric poetry to the program.

Research is on non-western music and dance performance traditions. Her area of interest is East Africa.

Specializes in U.S. foreign relations, recent U.S. history, and Latin American history, with a special interest in Brazil.

### Putting Learning into Practice

- Each spring two first-year or sophomore students travel to Japan cost-free for two weeks as part of the Technos International Week. The itinerary includes a four-day program at Technos International College, tours of the City of Tokyo, villages, country sides and a mountain resort.
- Graduates pursue additional study at renowned institutions including American University, Georgetown, University of Chicago, Johns Hopkins, and Rotary International.
- Alumni have careers with the U.S. Department of Commerce, Dept. of Justice, Dept. of State, the non-profit sector, and in law, banking, consulting, hotel management, marketing and education.
